Enclosed please find a copy of the CDS Family & Behavioral Health Services, Inc. 2014 Annual Report.

In the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 2014 of the youth who received services in our residential program, Interface Youth Program, 100% were not adjudicated while working with our staff and 97.7% completed our shelter program.

In our non-residential program, Family Action, 89.5% of youth served successfully completed services.

Prevention Services provided evidenced based programs to 2,138 youth whose average pre-test score was 54.8% and average post-test score was 82.6%.

Last year in our Interface Youth Program, 510 satisfaction surveys were completed by parents and youth with 94.4% reporting overall satisfaction with services received. In our Family Action Programs, 100% of 117 parents and 99.1% of 112 youth completing surveys reported overall satisfaction with services.

Finally, we are proud that our 2014 Stakeholders survey revealed that 100% of those responding answered Strongly Agree or Agree to the following statement: "CDS has a good working relationship with our organization."



CDS Interface Youth Shelter

Interface - Residential Services

Interface Youth Shelters are located in Gainesville, Palatka, and Lake City. Youth ages 10 through 17 that are homeless, runaway, truant, or not getting along at home stay at the shelters where they participate in a social skills development program and counseling when they are not at school. For many, this is a positive lifechanging experience for both youth and their families. It's nice to know Interface is there when you need it!

Major Accomplishments in 2014

- Interface provided residential services to a total of 464 youth at three CDS Interface Youth Shelters (Gainesville, Palatka, & Lake City)
- 97% of youth successfully completed the program
- Of those completing surveys, 98% of parents and 90% of youth expressed overall satisfaction with the program





CDS Interface Youth Shelters are part of a national network of shelters to help youth throughout the United States. CDS accepts participants through the National Runaway Safeline and National Safe Place programs.

Interface Youth Program East in Palatka received a Federal Basic Center Grant this year to provide extra assistance to Runaway and Homeless youth. One activity that has been quite popular among participants is creating a nutritious garden for the Shelter.

*Laura Learns Skills for Success at Interface!

Laura was refusing to follow instructions at home. She wouldn't do her chores and was being disrespectful towards her mother. Conflicts between mother and daughter were getting worse. They finally agreed to give CDS Interface Youth Shelter a try.

Laura was apprehensive about Interface, but did comply with the program rules and participated in all the counseling sessions. It didn't take her long to reach Achievement level (the highest level) at Interface.

When Laura completed the Interface program, she went home and started implementing the conflict resolution skills she learned at the shelter. She and her mother were able to communicate more effectively and so are getting along much better.

Laura is now doing well in school as a dualenrollment student (attending college while still in high school). She is playing in the band, making honor roll, and participating in a 3-hour block medical program at school. She plans to attend a state university when she graduates so she can become a Registered Nurse.

The interpersonal skills Laura learned at Interface will help her become successful not only at home, but at school, and eventually in her chosen occupation. She was recently recognized for her social skills and good behavior by receiving the Youth Success Day Award.

CDS Counseling Program

Family Action

CDS offers non-residential counseling through Family Action. Last year, the Family Action program received funding to expand, hiring four new counselors to serve our rural areas (Bradford, Hamilton, and Levy Counties). Local schools continue to partner with CDS by providing office space, telephones, and fax lines for our counselors. Family Action seeks to help youth ages 6 to 17 who are truant, running away, or experiencing issues with their parents.

Our goal is to keep families intact by addressing issues of trust and respect, while improving communication in family relationships.

Major Accomplishments in 2014

- 504 youth and families were served
- 100% of 117 parents and 99.1% of 112 youth completing surveys reported overall satisfaction with services
- 89% of youth admitted successfully completed services

"My counselor helped me control my anger and also helped me get more understanding with my family. I'd also like to thank you for all the hard work you put into this. You never gave up on us or never quit on us. You were always there when me and my family needed you the most. Thank you for all the support you gave to us. If it wasn't for you, I'd be in big trouble."

Outreach

CDS staff want to make sure that those who need our help, receive it. To get the word out that CDS services are available, staff along with the help of volunteers, attend many events and speak to lots of youth and adults each year.

Volunteering

Did you know that CDS engages dozens of volunteers in our programs? New volunteer training is offered three times each year. Most volunteers help at the CDS Interface Youth Shelters. But others assist in administrative duties, Safe Place program, and at outreach events.

During this past year, 63 new volunteers attended training. Volunteers contributed 3,357 hours of service to CDS, making an in-kind contribution valued at \$71,303.

from school. Caleb was involved with a gang and fought benefits of entering the Job Corps or returning to high with people all the time. Needless to say, Caleb did not get school. All of a sudden Caleb realized this was his life and along with his family, teachers, and police officers.

Caleb's first week at Interface was tough. He faced many challenges communicating with staff and following Caleb was able to set aside his anger and start to see things instructions. He even ran away.

But when he came back, Caleb was ready to make some changes. He asked his counselor to help him become emancipated. He wanted nothing to do with his family any more.

Caleb's counselor treated him with respect and helped him look at all his options. They explored the guidelines and

Caleb was an angry teen. He used drugs and was suspended procedures for emancipation. Together they considered the he had the power to make choices that would benefit him. It was as if a light bulb went off in his head!

> from other family members' points of view. He started participating more in both family and individual counseling sessions. His behavior and attitude improved dramatically. When Caleb completed the Interface program he left with positive goals in place for the future.

CDS Independent Living

The CDS mission in working with youth in the foster care system and throughout their transition to adulthood is to help them realize their goals and full potential as contributing members of the community.

CDS services are built on the relationships that have been established by monthly or more frequent contact with youth by our Independent Living Family Care Counselors.

Youth and young adults are encouraged to:

- ·Learn and demonstrate the skills needed to establish and work towards the attainment of educational, vocational, and employment goals.
- •Receive individualized life skill instruction and education, employment training, and vocational opportunities that support their goals.
- Develop and mature toward responsible adulthood by demonstrating social and daily living skills, household management skills and by learning to be self-sufficient.

On January 1, 2014 "My Future, My Choice" became law. The legislation includes an Extended Foster Care (EFC) provision allowing young adults to remain in care or reenter care until age 21 and age 22 with a documented disability. To date, CDS has had 7 young adults express a desire to remain in EFC while pursuing their goals of a high school diploma, GED, or vocational training certificate.

*Paul's Independent Living Success Story

Paul comes from a background of domestic violence and substance abuse and has been in and out of the system most of his life spending time in group homes, relative placements, and shelters. Paul had a history of running away to keep as far away from the system as he could.

When he was located at age 17, there was a pick up order on him which placed him in a residential substance abuse facility. This is where his relationship with the CDS Independent Living Program began.

At his first meeting with a CDS counselor, Paul was not happy at all with his placement and continued to threaten to run away if we did not allow him to stay with his mother. As he and his counselor continued to work together they worked on skills such as communication,

educational planning, and taking responsibility for our own actions. Paul began to soften and see the role he could play to get past his current situation. Counseling began to center more and more on education and completing the GED prior to Paul turning 18 years old. Paul's grandmother and mother also participated in the planning and were instrumental in helping to keep Paul focused.

Paul successfully completed the treatment program and passed the GED on his first attempt. Paul is now 18 and will continue working with the Independent Living Program. Paul's CDS counselor is helping Paul transition to an apartment and is assisting him to register as a college freshman.

Prevention Services

The CDS Prevention Project continues to place strong emphasis on relationships as a means of addressing the prevention needs of youth in Alachua and Levy

Major Accomplishments in 2014:

- 1,445 students completed the Too Good for Drugs Program at 3 Levy County Schools with an average pre-test score of 66% and posttest score of 91%
- 422 students completed the Too Good for Violence Program at Williston Elementary School with an average pre-test score of 53% and post-test score of 88%
- 260 students completed Project Success at 3 Alachua County Schools with an average pre-test score of 44% and post-test score of 71%
- 11 students completed Life Skills
 Training at the Reichert House with
 an average pre-test score of 56%
 and post-test score of 85%.

Counties. Through collaborative partnerships with the Alachua and Levy County School Boards and the Levy County Prevention Coalition, CDS was able to provide services to 2,138 students.

Too Good for Drugs and Violence Programs

Prevention staff facilitated the "Too Good for Drugs" curriculum at Chiefland Elementary School (all students grade 2-5) and at Bronson Elementary School (grade K-5). In Williston Elementary School, students (grade 3-5) rotated into CDS classes once a week like music & art.

Project Success

Project Success is an evidence based program that provides substance abuse education for sixth and seventh grade students in small group settings. This was offered at Howard Bishop MS, Lincoln MS, and Horizon Center Alternative School in Alachua County.

Alachua County Health Promotion and Wellness Coalition

The Prevention Project has been a collaborative partner with the Alachua

County Health Promotion and Wellness Coalition formerly known as the PIPSA Coalition since its inception. The HPW Coalition became a nonprofit organization in June 2014. In May, the Coalition hosted their 8th Annual Town Hall Meeting "Having the Intoxication Conversation." There were 264 attendees, their most successful event ever!

Levy County Prevention Coalition

The Levy County Prevention Coalition was one of 180 Coalitions nationwide to receive the Drug Free Communities Support Grant funding. Coalition staff and Board Members successfully completed training at the National Coalition Academy at Camp Dodge JMTC, Johnston, Iowa. The Coalition has been implementing environmental strategies throughout Levy County. They have hosted Responsible Beverage Server trainings in Cedar Key, Chiefland, Inglis and Williston. They held the County's first RX Drug Drop Off in Bronson in April 2014. collecting 7 DEA bags full of unused prescription drugs.

30 Years of LOVE

Ms. Gwen Love crossed a major milestone with CDS this year. She is the first employee to reach the 30 year mark with CDS Family & Behavioral Health Services!

Originally hired in 1984 as a Community Liaison, Gwen was promoted to the position of Prevention Coordinator in 1991 where she continues to lead many successful prevention initiatives.




