We are pleased to share a copy of the CDS Family & Behavioral Health Services, Inc. 2021 Annual Report.

In the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 2021 of the 249 youth who received services in our residential program, Interface Youth shelter, 99% successfully completed our shelter program and 100% remained crime free.

In our community counseling program, Family Action, 362 youth and families were served with 100% successfully completing services.

In our SNAP (Stop Now and Plan) programs 40 families participated in services with 100% successfully completing the program.

Prevention Services provided the evidence based programs to 3,281 elementary and middle school youth.

Last year in our Independent Living program, 85 youth and young adults received support and guidance from our counselors.

We are proud that our last Stakeholders survey revealed that 100% of those responding answered Strongly Agree or Agree to the following statement: "CDS has a good working relationship with our organization."

We are so fortunate to have a dedicated and committed board, and on behalf of our Directors we extend our gratitude to staff, community partners and volunteers for their ongoing support of the CDS mission:










## MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD PRESIDENT & CEO

The good news is CDS navigated COVID challenges quite well. The difficult news is COVID continues to impact our organization. In spite of these challenges – due to our wonderful, dedicated, and professional staff – we have continued to offer superlative services to all our clients.

We take this opportunity to offer sincere appreciation to our staff and community partners. These have always formed the bedrock of quality that has identified CDS for more than 50 years.

2021 saw two long-sought and vital results. Among these:

- Due to continued strong support from Sen. Keith Perry and Representative Chuck Clemons, we were awarded a \$1.2 million appropriation for the building of a new Interface Central Shelter.
- Our efforts to secure a 50-year lease of State land on NE 39th Avenue (Gainesville) was approved and signed. We now have 12+ acres just East of the Gainesville airport, which will become our new Campus. The new Shelter will be the first building on the Campus.

Early this year, CEO Jim Pearce announced his intention to retire. The Board impaneled a search committee and after diligent work identified a our interim CEO, Tracey Ousley. We are delighted for Tracey and anticipate a seamless continuation of CDS's success and effectiveness. Jim and Tracey will work together to insure an excellent transition.

I close with a statement of profound thanks and appreciation to Jim for his 25 years of extraordinary leadership which has positioned CDS as the preeminent organization it is today.

It's been a great year and thanks to all of you we look forward to an even better 2022.

## NATIONAL RUNAWAY MONTH

Each year CDS partners with the National Runaway Safeline to shine a light on National Runaway Prevention Month in November. CDS brings awareness to the community on the experiences of runaway and homeless youth to prevent youth homelessness. As part of CDS mission to keep children safe, CDS sponsors the Safe Place program that provides access to immediate help and supportive resources for youth in need through our Interface Youth Shelters. Join us this month and continue to support CDS and its efforts to keep our youth safe and out of the streets.

## INTERFACE YOUTH SHELTER

Interface Youth Shelters are located in Alachua, Putnam, and Columbia counties. Youth, ages 10 through 17, who are experiencing homelessness, runaway, truant, or conflicts at home stay at the shelters. Their stay typically lasts 3 to 5 weeks at a time. While there, they participate in social skills development programs, counseling, and maintain their routine of attending school. Here at CDS youth shelters, we strive to generate a positive, lifechanging experience for both youth and their families.



## CDS

CDS has offices in Gainesville, Lake City, and Palatka and its services cover an eleven county area, including: Alachua, Bradford, Columbia, Dixie, Lafayette, Gilchrist, Hamilton, Suwannee, Levy, Putnam, and Union. CDS is the sole provider of many of its services, such as runaway shelters, in North Central Florida, An additional three counties are served with the Independent Living Program for youth aging out of foster care: Baker, Madison, and Taylor.

## **PREVENTION SERVICES**



The year was filled with challenges due to COVID and the ever-changing environment that has defined the past year. Due to the strong collaborative partnerships and commitment of our school partners, CDS Prevention Services staff members were allowed to return to their classrooms to continue our program services. That was not the case for many other community organizations. Over the past year our collaborative partnerships allowed Prevention Services to serve 2,857 students from Kindergarten to 8th grade in Alachua and Levy County schools through the implementation and facilitation of evidence based curriculums.

The past year was like nothing we have ever had to experience, with quarantines, positive COVID test and COVID illness. However, due to the commitment of our partners and staff to educating students we are still providing services.

## **FAMILY ACTION COUNSELING**

Family Action Central Community Counseling provides free counseling for youth ages 6-17 and their families. One of the main goals of Family Action is prevention. As a result, we try to address the problematic behaviors before they are beyond the control of either the youth or the parent. Family Action provides 12 weeks of free counseling and/or Case management for ungovernable, truant, or runaway behaviors. Because we are Person-Centered, Family Focused, and Solution-Focused, we believe the participant and family possess the internal resources needed for change and growth. Thus, our services are often collaborative in nature on personal goals and internal resources. Here at Family Action Central, we take pride in providing comprehensive and free services to children and families in need in order to truly strengthen communities by building strong families. "

## OUTREACH

CDS staff wants to make sure that those who need our help receive it. To spread the word that CDS services are available free of charge to the community, our staff, along with the help of many of our volunteers, attend events around the counties we service to talk to parents, guardians and most importantly, the youth.



## NATIONAL SAFE PLACE & NATIONAL RUNAWAY SAFELINE

CDS Interface Youth Shelters are part of a national network of shelters to help youth throughout the United States. Safe Place Specialists in Alachua, Putnam, and Bradford counties speak to thousands of children and teens each year about staying safe. They cover age-appropriate topics ranging from staying close to caregivers in public spaces to keeping safe from human traffickers through their Safe Place presentations.



## SNAP: STOP NOW AND PLAN

SNAP is an evidence-based, cognitive-behavioral program that helps children and their families learn how to effectively manage their emotions. The SNAP program is designed for children ages 6 to 11 who are engaging in counter-productive behaviors with their families, peers, and teachers. Experienced and highly trained staff work with each family for 13 weeks to assess individual challenges and develop an action plan for success and prevent future negative behaviors and chances of conflict with family, peers, and authority figures. SNAP services are completely free to the youth and their families! A meal is provided at every session. Transportation and sibling care can be provided, as well.



## INDEPENDENT LIVING

The Independent Living Program works with youth in the foster care system throughout their transition into adulthood by helping them realize their goals and full potential as contributing members of the community. Our participants build relationships with our Independent Living Counselors through frequent contact to facilitate the youth's transition and ultimate success as an independent citizen. They are encouraged to learn skills needed to work towards educational, vocational, and employment goals.


